RECEPTION


This week the children have learnt the sounds th, z, ch, qu, x. The children have had great fun using their sounds to begin to write; to writing messages on little post it notes and envelopes to marking our playground using the chalk. The children have also had great fun accessing our new literacy shed which is full of mark making tools and books. In maths we have continued our learning about 1, 2 and 3. We have been looking at where the numbers appear on the clock. We have been playing games this week to help us understand the different ways to make 3. In our topic, we have had great fun learning about hibernation. The children have worked together to help our classroom hedgehog to go on a safe and warm hibernation by making lots of paper leaves. We have also made a great start in learning three of our nativity songs.

DAFFODIL

We have been very kind this week and celebrated difference through story time and circle time.

Year 1 have had a busy week, in maths some children have started exploring 2D and 3D shapes, using feely bags to feel their edges and corners. We have also experimented with which shapes can roll and which can't and why. Other children have been looking at subtraction, using a variety of strategies e.g. crossing out, a number line and concrete resources.

In English we have continued inventing our own stories about going on a quest, we have been coming up with alternative endings and sharing our work with the class. We have continued consolidating our set 2 sounds in phonics.

In Science we have explored materials and discussed how our life would be different if everything we touched throughout the day turned into something bendy. In topic we have listened to a story from famous explorer Amelia Earheart and talked about where we would like to explore in the world and made postcards. In art we have made Christmas decorations for each other, being thoughtful about what someone else would like.

Next week we will be talking about weather in topic, we will be looking at writing letters to father Christmas in English and thinking about how we can do things for others.

SUNFLOWER

This week Year 2 have continued their maths learning on multiplication using arrays. They are now able to read repeated addition number sentences (eg, 5+5+5+5=) and articulate exactly what they need to do to solve them. Children can say how many columns they will need in their array and how many items in each column. Once the array is made or drawn, children can count on in multiples of 2,3, 5 or 10 to find the answer.

In literacy, children have written their own versions of Little Charlie and have thoughtfully changed the settings and characters. They have produced wonderful, enticing book covers displaying the title and author of the story. They are looking forward to bringing home a copy of their book to share with you.

Our topic learning on the Great Fire of London has been a marvellous and messy affair! We have been working in art to create collages of the fire and timber framed houses. In Topic, we worked as a team and attempted to pass buckets of water along a class line without spilling it, in the same way that Londoners did in 1666 in an attempt to put out the fire. We have had lots of fun this week and have worked really hard. Well done Year 2!

In math's we have focused on multiplying and dividing by 3. We have learnt a variety of ways to do this, such as repeated addition, number lines and arrays. Next week we will continue to develop and deepen these skills.

On Monday we found out more about Walter Tull and the trenches. We then used this information to write a letter responding to our questions from the previous week.

FOXGLOVE

Foxglove Class have had another exciting, learning week.

In Maths, we have been learning about multiplication. We started by finding groups of an equal number; using counters and adding each group.

Next, we used repeated addition, now we understand how to multiply we are working on our times tables every day.

In English we put our Tool Kit to good use by writing our own stories based on Adventure at Sandy Cove, using all the tricks and tips we have learned to help create tension, suspense and action. This is a great technique for drawing in our audience.

In Art this week we have been designing our very own treasure chests.

Secret pockets, imaginary keys, objects encrusted with jewels and velvet are some of our ideas.

Our thoughts are with Jim Hawkins at the Admiral Benbow and how his story develops in Treasure Island.

In Topic the children have been learning about the grid references used in Ordnance Survey maps.

We have studied an area of Purbeck and South Dorset: Map 15.

Using our knowledge of map making we have been creating our own Treasure Island maps using the O.S system and key for landmarks.

In Science this week we have been investigating the question.... What is evaporation?

The children were very keen to design a test and to predict the outcome of our test.

We boiled water in a kettle and caught the steam in a glass beaker, where had it gone?

Why were there water droplets in the beaker?

What had happened?

We discussed breathing on to a car window or a bedroom window in the winter and writing our names in the condensation.


WOW OF THE WEEK




Year 4: Wow work by Kaya.
