

The staff at Avanti Gardens are so excited that we will be welcoming back all of the children on Monday 8th March. We are aware that our children may have had different experiences of lockdown and want to ensure we are supporting their mental health and well-being.



On our first day back, we will be having a well-being day. This will give the children the opportunity to settle back into the school environment. In Maths we have begun to look at 9 and 10 and have started to compare numbers up to 10. I was very lucky to see Otis' colourful representations of 9 and 10.




It has been very lovely to catch up with you all this week and I cannot wait until we can all share our fabulous learning back in the classroom.

FOXGLOVE


Hello Foxglove Families,





Many thanks and stay safe and if you have any problems let me know



Top Stories News events from around the world... and beyond

It was like a scene from a Hollywood science fiction blockbuster! A spacecraft hurtles towards a Red Planet at over 5km a second....


The NASA Perseverance Rover safely landed on Mars on the 18th February 2021. The American Space Agency released stunning footage showing the rover plunging through the planet's atmosphere before landing on the surface of Mars. Perseverance had many cameras on board, seven of which were dedicated to recording the landing itself. The footage is crystal clear, showing Mars' terrain and colour.

We hope you all managed to see this. If not, then here is the link: Watch the landing here...

The footage starts with the Perseverance's parachute deploy, which helped slow its descent. Its heat shield is then separated to allow the camera facing downward to give people their "first look" at Mars' surface. The rover landed at Mars' Jerico Crater. Scientists believe the area was once flooded with water and was home to an ancient river delta—and it could be one of the most ideal places to find evidence of ancient microbial life. How fascinating!

Their imagery represents vital feedback for engineers as they look to improve still further the technologies used to put

probes on the surface of the Red planet.





This is the 24th year that the event has been held. The day is also acknowledged globally in over 100 countries across the world.





WOW OF THE WEEK




Hussayn has been using his cutting, folding and sticking skills to create a 3D shape. He showed great determination when undertaking this task. Well done Hussayn.

Year 1: Phoebe spent the day in the woods this week where she was looking for signs of Spring, she spotted a Monkey Puzzle tree and collected some of the leaves, showing me them on our video call. Phoebe also collected some bits of wood and told me about the markings, noticing that one looked like a Rainbow. Phoebe has planned what she is going to use the wood for, to create a house for her toys.



Year 2: This week's WOW work come from Joey and Elba. Both have been putting in so much effort with all of their home learning. This week they have really shone in Maths and Literacy. Thay have been using all the tools in our Super Sentence toolkit to write wonderful sentences about The Colour Monster. They have really focused on using correct punctuation, fantastic letter formation and pre-cursive handwriting to write interesting sentences that make sense! They have also been exploring 2D and 3D shapes around the home and outside in the garden. Fantastic work super stars!





Year 3:

Louis is wow work of the week for Year 3 in Science. He has created an amazing diagram of the plant and has really paid close attention to the details. Well done Louis on labelling correctly all the different part of a plant. Louis has picked to describe the function of the flower. Which part did you describe?



Year 4: This weeks foxglove's WOW work goes to Kaya. Kaya has just begun to go back to school in the keyworker bubble and the staff were impressed by her behaviour and work. This week they explored the life cycle of a flowering plant. She gets the wow work for creating an amazing picture of daffodils sprouting. Well done Kaya!



Year 5/6: This weeks WOW work goes to Martha. She has shown great attention to detail, linking her art to the science topic on how plants grow. Excellently detailed root structure and a good visual representation of the stages of how plants grow.


