CLASS UPDATES

RECEPTION

This week we have been looking at why our planet is so important and how we can look after it. We started off by reading the book 'Here We Are' and considering what makes our world wonderful? The children came up with so many great examples of what is wonderful about our world. After lots of discussion we created paintings of 'our wonderful world' which are now all combined to make one big, wonderful world in out cloakroom!

We have all learnt a poem called 'The World is Watching!'. We collectively came up with actions to support the retelling of this poem and again the children have blown me away with their recitation skills.

We have had some very informative talks from both Greenpeace and Bristol waste company. The children listened and engaged with the talks excellently. In maths we have been looking at patterns. We have explored them in many different ways. We have identified, continued, and made our own colour patterns. We worked as a class to create movement and sound patterns and then the children were creative in the outdoor space using resources around them to make even more patterns!

In Maths we have been exploring weight and mass, we have been using balancing scales to weigh different objects around the classroom, comparing their weights and ordering the weight of objects from lightest to heaviest.

We began the week by thinking about what Great has been fighting for and how we can help promote the same message of saving our precious planet. In Literacy we began the week by writing instructions to an alien explaining how to look after our beautiful planet and we then began exploring poems and writing our own poems about nature using our senses. We created our own musical instruments from our recycling, learnt about how we can reduce our carbon footprint, and explored, using art work, how our planet will look if we don't look after it. It was inspiring to listen to Richard from Greenpeace and we had a lot of questions about what we can do in school to help the planet.


We finished our week with Earth Hour where we turned off all electrical items and Year 1 were in charge of checking other classrooms had done the same. It truly has been an inspiring week!

SUNFLOWER

Hello Sunflower families,

I am filled with huge pride and admiration for year 2 children this week. They have approached our Enrichment week learning with compassion, empathy, and a desire to learn and do more!

Our learning has focused on the text "Our House is on Fire" by Jeanette Winter. This is the story of how Greta Thunberg came to lead a global movement to save the planet. Her quote "You are never too small to make a difference" resonated with us all, and children in Y2 have been using their voices to call for change.

All children have been inspired to write letters to influential people to ask the question "WHAT WILL YOU DO?" They have begun writing to The Mayor, The Queen, Boris Johnson, Greenpeace and Mr Milum, amongst others. In their letters they raise some of the key issues and ask the recipient to make a commitment to change, including reducing single use plastic consumption, switching to renewable energy sources, and making recycling a legal requirement.

I look forward to sending the letters once finished and will keep you updated on any responses!

In Art, children recreated the artwork from the book, drawing self-portraits at protest, in a cartoon style. We've created a powerful display in our classroom as a reminder of this week's learning.

In Maths, we have been collating and interpreting data linked to the environment. We created a tally-chart of how children travelled to school and discussed the most eco-friendly ways.

Children also went on a litter-pick around the school grounds, sorted the litter into groups and represented what we'd collected using a pictogram.

We analysed data on the Great Barrier Reef to work out how many of each marine animal were spotted during a dive and were saddened to see that plastic bags had also been found. This led to a passionate "Save our Seas" discussion.

We were also able to make links to this term's Topic learning on Urban Farming and discussed the benefits of growing food in our cities. The children were able to articulate that this would mean less plastic wrapping and fewer food miles. We also discussed urban beekeeping and spent some time planting, including a mini bee and butterfly garden. Children were mesmerized by a natural hive on our school grounds. We produced a small beehive for our classroom display, with each child using their thumb print to make a bee, which we put together to represent teamwork and our commitment to help the planet.


Finally, it gives me great pleasure to announce that we have elected our class eco reps.

Each candidate wrote and delivered their own speech on what make them great for the role.

Sunflower class voted for Robin and Ember. Robin said he "Really likes the environment and wants to take care of it." Ember agreed, saying" I love the planet and everything on it.

I hate that people are polluting our environment." We know they will both do a fantastic job helping us all to do our bit.

Dear year 3 children and families,



We have also created a tally chart of how children travel to school, which would hopefully lead to some greater discussion about the best ways to travel to save the planet.



We had a very interesting LIVE talk and presentation from our local Greenpeace activist via ZOOM.


The children learnt a great deal about the work of Greenpeace around the world.



The week so far...

- Reception Mr Evans will be teaching reception each Friday pm instead of Mr Dyer in the morning as there has been a switch in the timetable. Mr Evans had his first lesson with the children last week and carried on Mr Dyers' good start! The children were focusing on fundamental movements such as hopping and balancing. As part of the session, they worked in teams to make their own obstacle course.
- Year 1 The children explored different way to travel as part of a warmup and then worked together in small groups to make a 3-part routine start, middle, and end. Pe champion was Sid for his amazing attitude towards learning and answering questions. Well done!
- Year 2 The children in year 2 demonstrated great understanding of 'rolling'...teddy bears, logs, you name it, they did it! We then used a range of apparatus to work on our balancing, rolling, and landing.


Year 2:





Why did Greta come to Bristol?

What an inspiring week we have had in school! We began the week by learning about what an Eco-School is and creating our Eco-club. Children across the school spoke about why they felt they would be a good candidate to represent the Eco-club, this was followed by voting and ballots.

Euan from Bristol Waste Company also spoke to the school about where our rubbish actually goes once we leave it out for the bin men. We learnt about the full journey of recycling and how our landfills continue to fill and harm our planet.

In Key Stage 1 the children have explored the 4 R's (Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, Refuse). They have created musical instruments from recycling, sorted recycling, written their own poems of how to save the planet and written persuasive letters to encourage others to do their part in saving the planet.








Writing Opportunities

In Key Stage 2 the children explored what climate crisis is, written pledges of how they will help to save the planet, written persuasive letters to companies about the amount of plastic packaging is used and performed speeches about our environmental issues. We then recorded these speeches using a Green Screen App! Watch up for the videos coming soon....









- 1) Greta Thunberg is an environmental activist. She was born in Stockholm, Sweden, in 2003. When she was eight, she started learning about climate change. The more she learned, the more baffled she became as to why so little was being done about it.
- **2)** At the age of 11, Greta became so sad about climate change that she temporarily stopped speaking!
- **3)** Greta has Asperger syndrome, a condition that affects how people socialise. But Greta views her condition as a positive, calling it her "superpower"! She says it helps her see the world in black and white, and that there are "no grey areas when it comes to climate change."
- **4)** In August 2018, Greta decided to take action. Instead of going to school, she made a large sign that read 'SCHOOL STRIKE FOR CLIMATE', and calmly sat down outside the Swedish parliament. Her aim? To make politicians take notice and act to stop global warming.
- **5)** Greta was inspired by teenage activists in Florida, USA, who were protesting to end gun violence.



Earth Hour

We ended our week with a whole school Earth Hour, where all electronics were turned off, children took part in art activities creating shared pieces to highlight the impact we are having on the Planet. The whole week has made us all think about those small changes we need to do in order to save our Planet.

Eco-School






