
Year 1 - Easter Holiday Homework

Dear Year 1 Parents

Please help your child work through this booklet to reinforce and enhance their reading and writing. You will see there are some sheets for your reference and some reading comprehension for the children to complete, as well as a writing task. Please remember to read daily for 10-15 minutes on Bug Club too! If your child finishes their books, they can re-read them for fluency and focus on answering more comprehension and inference questions. Also, visit the local library to take out books!!

Use this mat (below) as reference – children should aim to read and spell these words independently. An important aspect is to help your child orally come up with sentences using the words below to help them understand in the context by which they should be used – you are **not expected** to write sentences using these words for homework!! They are not phonetically decodable so harder for the children to learn.



Writing

Children should use an A3 or A4 sheet of paper to **make a poster** to write a recount of an exciting activity they took part in over the holidays. They should include sentences and photographs or drawings. Support your child by thinking about and using the correct sentence structure, past tense, describing feelings with reasons and exciting vocabulary. Please return this on the first day back in the new term.


* Nothing needs to recorded in your child's homework book.

Reading Comprehension

The children are showing a better understanding of the books that they read according to their ability. Please remember to spend time asking your child questions when reading his/her book – there are examples of questions to ask on our website: http://avanti.org.uk/avantihouse-primary/reading.

It is important for the children to start learning how to read a passage of text and answer questions based on the text by writing the answers on paper; therefore, we have given some for homework. If the text is too hard for your child, read it together and then answer the questions together. Children are allowed to read the text and questions as many times as they require.

All about...

Barn Owls

Some barn owls are nocturnal but also they can be seen at sunset or early morning. They have a white, heart-shaped face and a white chest with small brown spots. Their back is tawny, marked with black and white spots. They are a similar size to a small cat.



Fascinating Facts

Barn owls make a screeching noise, not a hoot like the tawny owl.

Baby owls are called owlets.

Where Do They Live?

Barn owls live in a range of habitats including farm buildings, dovecotes, church towers, hollow trees and cliff sites. Some owls prefer to live in the open grasslands, farmlands and woodlands that are no more than 2,000 metres high. Some of these species are also found along the edges of woods.

What Do They Eat?

Barn owls eat mainly small mammals like voles, shrews, rats and mice. Sometimes they eat birds, insects and even frogs. On average, a wild barn owl eats about 4 small mammals per night, that's 1,460 per year.

Staying Safe

If they feel threatened, they will squint their eyes, spread their wings and sway their head back and forth, while hissing. If this does not stop their attacker, the barn owl will lie on its back and protect itself with its sharp talons.


