





"I am Boggle-Eye Bill," said the captain defiantly. "Captain of The Flying Dutchcan!"





"Arrrrrrrr, it's alive! The treasure is haunted! Let's get out of here!" shouted the jelly pirate, his whole body wobbling with fear.









straight into space.




"Ah, Sally, there you are," said Dad. "They were a strange bunch. I wonder what got into them."
