
There are hundreds and hundreds of steps leading to the top of the tower. Along the walls are paintings of witches, wizards, knights and swans.

Listen carefully, Reader. This story should be about a brave knight named Anna. You should have met Anna on page 4, but Gubbs has messed everything up! He must be up to no good.



Come on, let's go into the woods. It is just ahead, on page 40.


What did you think of Gubbs? I don't like him at all. Did you see all those dead flowers around him on page 4? How creepy.

Gubbs must have captured Anna and hidden her in this book. Maybe if we find Gubbs, he will tell us where Anna is!








Hello! Are you talking about the ugly man with the dead flowers? Yes, I've seen him.
