

SAFEGUARDING-RADICALISATION WORKSHOPS



Radicalisation workshops took place in key Stage 2 recently by professional educationalist who through discussion and dialogue explored what radicalisation means with pupils.

You might hear words like extremism and radicalization from your children or on the news, but what do they mean?

Radicalisation is when someone starts to believe or support extreme views. They could be pressured to do things illegal by someone else. Or they might change their behaviour and beliefs.

This could happen if they feel:

- isolated and lonely or wanting to belong
- unhappy about themselves and what others might think of them
- embarrassed or judged about their culture, gender, religion or race
- stressed or depressed
- fed up of being bullied or treated badly by other people or by society
- angry at other people or the government
- confused about what they are doing
- pressured to stand up for other people who are being oppressed.

Someone who has been radicalised might believe that sexual, religious or racial violence is OK. They may be influenced by what they see online. And they might have links to extreme groups that preach hate.

What is extremism?

When people have very strong opinions, these could become extreme. People who have certain beliefs about politics or religions which are hateful, dangerous or against the law are often known as extremists. This harmful behaviour is called extremism. Extremists might use violence to express their views. And extremist racial or religious groups might use hate, fear or violence to control and influence people. You may have heard different groups mentioned, like Daesh, also known as ISIS or IS but there are other groups like Combat 18 who are also considered to be extremists.

ATTENDANCE

Why is it important for children not to miss school?

Most parents want their children to get on well in life. Nowadays, it is more important than ever to have a good education behind you if you want opportunities in adult life. Children only get one chance at school, and your child's chances of a successful future may be affected by not attending school or regularly.

If children do not attend school regularly they may:

- Struggle to keep up with school work. In a busy school day it is difficult for schools to find the extra time to help a child catch up.
- Miss out on the social side of school life. Poor attendance can affect children's ability to make and keep friendships; a vital part of growing up.

Being on time is also vital. Arriving late at school can be very disruptive for your child, the teacher, and the other children in the class. Pupils who arrive late often feel embarrassed. I spoke to a pupil in Key Stage 2 who said: *'I hate it when I am late. I have to walk into the lesson when everyone is working and I just don't know what to do. It makes me feel really stressed. I have to stand in line with all the other late parents and I know I am missing my learning.'*

Imagine if this is how your child is feeling every morning because they are late - as an adult how many of us would feel like this child turning up for work late or to an important appointment?

Attending school every day = 100% attendance.

Attending 4 half days a week = 90% attendance = 4 weeks missed per year

Attending 4 days a week = 80% attendance = more than half a term missed per year or 2 full years missed over the course of their school career.

Attending 3 half days each week = 70% attendance = more than a quarter of the school year missed.

An average attendance of 80% or less across a child's school career adds up to missing a **whole 2 years** from school.

Being late for school reduces learning time.

If your child is 5 minutes late every day they will miss three days of learning each year.

If your child is 15 minutes late every day they will miss 2 weeks of learning each year.

AVANTI AND ILFORD JEWISH PRIMARY SCHOOL LEARN FROM EACHOTHER!



It was an absolute pleasure to take out PRE Ambassadors to Ilford Jewish Primary School on Tuesday 10th October 2017 to learn all about the Jewish festival of Sakkot.

Ambassadors learnt about the time when Jewish slaves made their journey to the promised land and were told by God to build temporary homes in the desert, which is why Ilford Jewish Primary School has a temporary home built in their playground. They learnt that the word sukkot means huts (some translations of the bible use the word booths), and building a hut is the most obvious way in which Jews celebrate the festival. They listened to two pupils who told them that Jewish families will build an open air structure in which to live during the holiday. The essential thing about the hut is that it should have a roof of branches and leaves, through which those inside can see the sky.

They also got to hold and smell an etrog (a citron fruit), a palm, myrtle and a willow branch, and learnt the importance of these during the festival.

Ambassadors were able to make comparisons between their own faith and the Jewish faith.

At Avanti Court Diwali is a very exciting time. Pupils have been learning about the Diwali stories in their English lessons and through the arts. In class, children made gorgeous sweets and lassi! We organised special assemblies where children presented classical singing, dancing and played a musical instruments. We took part in the Govardhan puja assembly where we created the Govardhan hill with sweets, and later prasadam was distributed to families in the playground. The children were really inspired by the Diwali drumming assemblies and workshops.
