


Welcome to our Spring 2 Newsletter.

Ambassadors-Rights Respecting Update: Our Journey So Far... Ms Vincent



We are a Rights Respecting School and recognise that the UNICEF Convention of Children's Rights exists without discrimination to protect every child within our school as well as in our communities and around the world. We are working alongside UNICEF on our Rights Respecting Journey to embed the language, understanding and behaviours that children need to respect and protect their rights and those of others. As an Avanti Trust School, this is fundamental to our mission: *To Make The World a Better Place*.

This term, children across the school have been learning about some of the Articles of the Convention and why these are so important. For example, within PSHE, children have been discussing how they can protect their right to be safe (Article 19), by seeking help from trusted adults and professionals including in an emergency. Assemblies run by our Senior Leaders have consolidated learning, ensuring that children understand who our safeguarding leads are, how to contact them and how they can help. Parv (Year 2) explained: 'The safeguarding leads support my rights because they listen to my worries and help me if I get hurt or injured - and they treat everybody fairly (Article 40)'

Children have also been learning about the power of their voice, as all children have the right to be listened to and for their opinions to be taken seriously-(Article 12). Children reflected on the challenges that less verbal children may have in expressing their ideas: Shrayash (Year 1) said: 'If somebody finds it hard to speak they might do actions or signs to tell us about their body boundaries, so we should look out for that and see if they want us to hold their hand.' As a result, children show a growing understanding of not only their rights but their responsibilities towards others.

Actions taken this term include:

- Right Respecting links included in all parent communications.
- Daily Collective worship linked to rights, for example, Article 14: Every child has the right to think and believe what they want and to practise their religion, as long as they are not stopping other people from enjoying their rights.
- Skills and knowledge surrounding rights and responsibilities taught through the PSHE unit: Living in the Wider World.

Our next Steps include:

- Teaching and learning across the curriculum will be linked to the Articles of the convention to support children to recognise some ways that their learning in all subjects can support their rights.
- To continue to train Ambassadors to be Rights Respecting Advocates for our community.
- To gradually introduce makaton signs and symbols to support less verbal children to ensure their voices are heard-(Article 12).

We are on a journey to creating a powerful culture of rights within our school community for the benefit of all its members. Of course, we could not do this without the support of our wonderful families. Here are some ways that you can help:


and combine their mosaics.

Travel Ambassadors-Making the World a Better Place



I'm sure you would agree that most of us have been inspired by a great leader. At Avanti, we recognise that we are all leaders as well as learners, and we all have the power to guide others in the small things that we do and say, every day. The Travel Ambassadors worked alongside the London Borough of Redbridge this term to look at the impact of physical exercise on their well being. They reported that just 5 minutes of walking made them feel energetic and just 1 minute of jogging made them feel happier-which is great evidence for increasing physical activity. The aims of the Ambassador group is to inform parents and pupils about the difference walking/biking to school will have on their mental and physical health. This links to the

Easter at Avanti

The performance was dedicated to celebrating the life of Jesus through spoken word, music and acting. This links to the Rights Respecting Article 15 (freedom of association) Every child has the right to meet with other children and to join groups and organisations, as long as this does not stop other people from enjoying their rights.

Branavan said: "Learning about Jesus and the crucifixion is important because it helps us remember the life he had in heaven."


Manish said: " It is important to learn about the faith of others so that we can learn from others and because it is our right."

Children in Year 2 made these wonderful silhouettes of the Cross. Children were inspired by the story of Easter and they used the different materials to create a sense of time and place. These pieces of art represent the hill of the crucifixion in Golgotha and the darkness that fell shortly after noon on Good Friday. Children also showed respect to all Christians all over the world in their messages to Jesus, linking to Article 14: Every child has the right to think and believe what they choose as long as they are not stopping other people from enjoying their rights.

Year 6 Visited the Manor!

Year 6 visited the Manor temple recently to learn not only about the faith, but the importance of sustainability. Pupils were given a tour of the estate, taking in the farm, gardens and temple. The visit gave the children both a cultural experience and an understanding of the part we can all play in making sure we treat the earth's resources with respect and care.

Pupils found out that the farms are cultivated without pesticides or herbicides and that the land is ploughed using oxen rather than machinery and fertilizer is made from cow manure. This links to the **Rights Respecting Article 29 (goals of education) It must encourage the child's respect for their own and other cultures, and the environment.**

Diraj said: "I found out that fertilizing the land using natural manure is far better than chemicals because manure adds natural nutrients to the land."

This educational visit links to the **Rights Respecting Article 31** (leisure, play and culture) Every child has the right to relax, play and take part in a wide range of cultural and artistic activities.

















Autism Awareness at Avanti

Year 5 performed the Easter story this year with makaton sign language. At Avanti, we understand that all children have the right to be heard and for their views to be taken seriously (Article 12 (respect for the views of the child) Every child has the right to express their views, feelings and wishes. We also recognise that for our less-verbal children, it can often be more challenging to express themselves clearly and feel understood. Therefore, we are joining forces with the wonderful Makaton Charity to introduce some signs and symbols to give all of our children the tools to have meaningful conversations with others and to communicate their needs. Makaton is a nationallyrecognised sign language that will empower our children to be super communicators. Signing is a very important way to keep children safe, as our pupils, including vulnerable pupils, will learn new ways of seeking help from trusted adults when things do not feel right.

By using Makaton, children and adults were able to take a more active part in the Easter assembly, because communication and language are the key to everything we do and learn.

Bullying



Bullying is behaviour that hurts someone else. It includes name calling, hitting, pushing, spreading rumours, threatening or undermining someone.

It can happen anywhere – at school, at home or online. It's usually repeated over a long period of time and can hurt a child both physically and emotionally. **Bullying can happen at Avanti Court.**

Types of bullying

Bullying can take different forms. It could include:

- physical bullying: hitting, slapping or pushing someone
- verbal bullying: name calling, gossiping or threatening someone
- non-verbal abuse: hand signs or text messages
- emotional abuse: threatening, intimidating or humiliating someone
- exclusion: ignoring or isolating someone
- undermining, constant criticism or spreading rumours
- controlling or manipulating someone
- making silent, hoax or abusive calls

The following types of bullying are also hate crime:

- racial, sexual, transphobic or homophobic bullying
- bullying someone because they have a disability.

What can you do as a parent?

Reassure your child that they have done the right thing by telling you about the bullying. Inform the school as a matter of urgency so that we can support your child and put an end to the bullying. The school will investigate all allegations of bullying seriously and will keep you informed of the process and the outcome.
