

Becoming an Avanti SSC Member - Eligibility Criteria

Anyone can become an SSC Member unless any of the following apply. You cannot become or remain an SSC Member if:

- you are aged under 18
- you have a mental disorder and have been detained under the Mental Health Act 1983
- you have been adjudged bankrupt and have not been discharged
- you are disqualified from being a company director
- you have been removed from office as a charity trustee because of maladministration
- you are prohibited from working in schools as a teacher or member of the support staff or from being the proprietor of an independent school
- you have been convicted in the last five years of a criminal offence resulting in a
 prison sentence of three months or more, whether suspended or not
- you have been convicted in the last twenty years of a **criminal offence** resulting in a prison sentence of two and a half years or more
- you have ever been convicted of a criminal offence resulting in a prison sentence of five years or more
- you have been fined under the Education Act 1996 for causing a nuisance or disturbance on a school site in the last five years
- you refuse to undertake a Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) check.
- you refuse to be subject to a S.128 check
- you do not meet the right to work criteria

This is a summary of the relevant Regulations that apply to appointment of school Governors. The Trust Board has agreed that these requirements shall apply to SSC Members. The Regulations have legal force: you cannot become an SSC Member if any of the above apply. If you are already an SSC Member and any of the above apply, you must immediately advise the Chair of the Trust Board and the Trust Governance Officer.
