


Classic & Modern Fiction










Poor Ellie is horrified when Tuffy drags a dead bird into the house. Then a mouse. But Tuffy can't understand what all the fuss is about




horrible grouchiness . . . or blow off the top of her head!




Gobbolino by Ursula Moray Williams is the charming tale of a witch's cat who would rather be a kitchen cat.






With wonderful stylish artwork by an artist of rare talent, this book describes through images and enchanting text the many different varieties of dragon and exactly why the different owners love them more than any other.






Poetry


picture on the wall, Hassan notices the maroon prayer mat, a bright green cushion and his sister Naima's pink dress - the new colours of home.




