Storytelling Week

Spring Term took us pupils into exciting new worlds from rainforests to Ancient Greece to Medieval murder scenes. Yes, this was KAPS Harrow's Storytelling Week where pupils learnt a lot of interesting things and did a lot of exciting activities to inspire us to write stories. We spoke to different year groups to see what they had been upto.

Let's start with Year 2. "We have been learning about Amelia Earheart," explained Aarna from Year 2R. "I learnt about how you should follow your dreams." This topic clearly has had an effect on the whole class as Amelia was a person who stood up for what she believed in. Year 4 had been reading Christoff's Story, a tale about a refugee boy. Radhika from Year 4V shared, "From hearing this story, I learnt that stories can tell feelings." This story taught students to empathise with characters.

Year 5 were looking at the interesting world of Greek mythology as part of a Southbank Writing project where they were contributing two chapters for a collaborative novel. They did several activities to inspire their writing such as making Greek pots, learning about Greek gods and comparing Hinduism and Hellenism (Greek mythology). "Writing part 1 of their story for our project was my favourite part of storytelling week." enthused Paarth from Y5B.

Finally, Year 6 was learning about Shakespeare's Macbeth. On the first day of storytelling week, pupils were met with a crime scene in their classroom. There he was: King Duncan himself (or at least an outline of his body) on the floor in front of the whiteboard, surrounded by bloody footprints. Pupils were then able to interview witnesses and potential suspects to write their own crime scene reports.

Storytelling certainly inspired all of us to tell very different stories.

Bikeability

Year 5 and 6 have been participating in a fun bike - riding experience whilst learning how to maintain their bikes. Many students have told us that they found the initial experience nerve - wracking although a valuable learning opportunity. Many had the fear of falling off their bikes.
