

# ADDITIONAL COMMENTS

#### **PE Delivery**

So far this year, I have been working with Mrs Chauhan to support her delivery in a variety of ways. We have focused primarily on three key objectives:

- 'Real-life PE' Building PE lessons based on minimum set-up time / equipment
- Pupil-led approach Encouraging pupils to manage their own games, decide their own rules and to pick their own teams
- Introducing new ideas and games which can be applied over a range of sports

Football has been the main sport that we have focused on with the children during the academic year so far, but we have also looked at cross-curricular links towards Maths in particular. Our individual objectives during our football lessons have been to improve ball control, develop teamwork skills and to build game understanding.

Over the latter stage of the term, we switched our sport to Handball and began to look at modified games associated with it. We have worked primarily on building game understanding and developing their understanding of the rules of Handball (3 steps when in possession, dribbling etc) and we have allowed the children to adapt the games to suit their group. We challenged children to organise their own teams so that we could work on their reasoning and communication skills, and also understanding the needs of others. Some groups have performed better at this than others, but we have seen this develop over the course of the term.

We have also encouraged children to learn to manage their own games and resolve small conflicts between themselves (for example, deciding whose throw-in it is).

Finally, due to inclement weather, we have also adapted our sessions to run Dance lessons within the classroom. The children particularly enjoyed the Haka lesson, which was particularly exciting! We encouraged the children to show their own creativity whilst empowering them to create their own routines!

#### **Reading Stars**

During Reading Stars this year, we have delivered 10 lessons to the children based on a range of techniques to help the children with their literacy work, including Skimming and Scanning (Week 1), the '5 Finger Rule' (Week 2) and Clarifying, Predicting and Questioning (Week 3).

Additionally, we have aimed to inspire children to read different forms of media, such as magazines, newspapers, programmes, blogs and of course, books! We have tried to infer feelings (Week 7/8), understand how to differentiate between facts and opinions (week 5) and we have studied different forms of Poetry (Week 9)!

Our additional PE lessons with the Reading Stars squad have focused mainly around football, allowing the children to showcase their abilities to work in small teams and manage their games themselves too!

We will be continuing with this over the remainder of the academic year and we will also be inviting the children who have attended Reading Stars to the Stadium for a Stadium Tour to celebrate their involvement with the programme.



#### **City Science**

At the end of our Reading Stars delivery for Term 1, we delivered 4 Science-based workshops as part of our trial period for our new programme, 'City Science'. The lessons led by Dr Alex Evans, with year 4 & 5, focused on KS2 Curriculum topics which

were linked to sport and exercise. For example, we looked at how sport would look in space, such as on different planets, and then in the 2<sup>nd</sup> week we developed research techniques to classify sports, and even design our own!

#### **KS2 Mixed Football Tournament**

In October, Krishna Avanti joined us at Stokeswood Primary School for our KS2 Mixed Football Tournament. All of the children, led by Mr Joshi, performed excellently and showed great sportsmanship during the fixtures too!



## Writing Stars Launch Day – 'Against All Odds'

Krishna Avanti were one of 6 schools who attended our Writing Stars Launch Day at the King Power Stadium. The 10 children who attended were able to develop their own poem, based around the theme of Diversity, with support and help from our Guest Speaker, local poet Mike Markham!

We also had guest speeches from Ria Thomas who spoke about how she has been a part of our Community Trust Young Leadership Group and local Paralympian Paige Murray who were both very inspiring for the children!



## **Looking forward**

Over the remainder of the academic year, I will be continuing to support teachers with their CPD within school, whilst we also have lots of activities planned between the School and Community Trust too!

Firstly, the school have signed up to our World Maths Day event, a series of maths-based workshops which is hosted at the home of Leicester City FC, the King Power Stadium.

We will also be welcoming representative teams to our KS2 Girls Only Festival and our KS1 Football Tournament which are both held during the Summer Term.

We have lots to look forward to over the upcoming months so it will be great to see so many children benefitting from the partnership!
